

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
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
Front cover: Cadover Cross, a Medieval wayside cross on Wigford Down (Walk 19)

WALK 1

Drewsteignton and Fingle Bridge

Start/finish Drewsteignton village car park (SX 736 909)

Distance 9.5km (6 miles)

Ascent 340m Time 3hrs

Terrain Low-level, but hilly walking on good paths and tracks

through woods and some fields

Maps OS Explorer OL28 (Dartmoor)

Refreshments Drewe Arms (01647 281377) and village shop/tearoom

at Drewsteignton; Fingle Bridge Inn (01647 281287);

From Drewsteignton the walk sets out along the Two Moors Way for a while before joining with the Dartmoor Way to arrive at Sharp Tor with views of the wooded Teign valley; from here a detour leads to Castle Drogo. The walk continues along the Hunters Path just below Castle Drogo before dropping down to the River Teign. The route then follows the tree-shaded river downstream to Fingle Bridge, home to the Fingle Bridge Inn. The final section meanders through woods back to Drewsteignton.

From the far end of the car park at Drewsteignton turn right along a path. Pass a thatched cottage and at the next cottage turn right following the tarred path through the churchyard, passing left of the **church**.

The **Church of the Holy Trinity** in Drewsteignton dates mostly from the 15th century. The thatchroofed Drewe Arms was known as the Druids' Arms; the name was changed in the 1920s when Julius Drewe built Castle Drogo (see later). For 75 years the pub was kept by Mabel Mudge, who retired in 1994 at the grand age of 99.



Keep ahead through the village square, passing the pub and village shop/tearoom (both on your right), then turn left along the road. Fork right at the junction (direction Whiddon Down) for 120 metres, then turn left at the fingerpost and the Two Moors Way stone. ▶ Follow the track downhill as it swings right.

Go through a gate at the bottom to enter **Rectory Wood**. Keep right at the junction and at the next junction turn left (Piddledown and Two Moors Way); straight on is a more direct route via steep steps. Having turned left, go right at the next junction and follow the track as it soon swings left to another junction. Turn right and keep ahead past some beech trees. Go through a gate and follow the right-hand fence through two fields. Exit through a gate and keep ahead to a path T-junction.

Turn right along the Hunters Path (now following the Two Moors Way and Dartmoor Way) for 350 metres to a signed junction at **Sharp Tor**. ▶ To visit Castle Drogo turn right (see detour route), otherwise go straight on along the Hunters Path to the next junction; the castle detour rejoins here from the right.

The commemorative stone is one of four placed along the route when it opened in 1976; the others are located at Ivybridge, Morchard Bishop and Lynmouth).

Take a short detour left for a great view of the valley, but be careful, it's a steep drop.

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Detour to Castle Drogo

Head north up the steps (signed to Castle Drogo). Go through a gate and keep ahead to a junction with a stony path. Turn right uphill then go left along the drive and fork right, following the signs for the castle entrance. Retrace your steps back along the drive, turn right down the stony path and keep right (straight on) at the junction. Follow the path as its swings right down steps and through a gate to rejoin the Hunters Path and turn right (adds 1.1km/3/4 mile).

The early 20th-century **Castle Drogo** – said to be the last castle built in England – was built by Sir Edwin Lutyens (1869–1944) for Julius Drewe (1856–1931), founder of the Home and Colonial Stores, which, in the 1920s, was one of the UK's largest retail chains. Drewe chose the site because he mistakenly believed that his ancestors had connections with the nearby village of Drewsteignton. The castle was given to the National Trust in 1974.

Main route

Keep along the wide path below Castle Drogo to a junction near Hunter's Tor where the main route goes right. ▶ Follow the path, with the castle up to the right, go through a gate and turn left down a tarred track (signed Fisherman's Path and River Teign) for 375 metres to a junction. Fork left along the track (Gibhouse and footpath) and, just before the cottage, fork left down a narrower path to a junction. Turn left and immediately turn right across the footbridge – known as the **Iron Bridge** – over the River Teign. ▶

Once across, turn left along the track with the wall on your left. Go through a gate and continue through Whiddon Wood with the River Teign on the left, soon passing the Hydro Turbine building.

The wall once formed part of the boundary of **Whiddon Deer Park** which was enclosed in the mid 16th century to contain a herd of fallow deer. Julius Drewe had two water-driven turbines installed on the River Teign to provide electricity for his newly built castle.

Keep along the riverside track through Hannicombe Wood to a junction at **Fingle Bridge** and turn left over the bridge, with the Fingle Bridge Inn on the right. ▶

The 17th-century **Fingle Bridge** which straddles the River Teign is a fine example of a three-arched packhorse bridge; on the south side of the river is a National Trust car park and toilets.

Head northwards along the lane (parking on right) for 140 metres and then turn sharp left to follow a bridleway up through Drewston Wood for 600 metres to a junction. Turn sharp right (almost doubling back) and follow the bridleway (Hunters Path to Drewsteignton) as it contours round the hill. Go through a gate and keep ahead at the crossing track. Cross a stream, continue to a track junction and keep right. At the next junction, keep

Take a quick 120metre detour by keeping left and going through a gate to Hunter's Tor, where there is another great view. Return to the junction and turn left.

WALK 1 - DREWSTEIGHTON AND FINGLE RRIDGE

The path along the north bank of the river is the Fisherman's Path that also leads to Fingle Bridge.

The path joining from the left is the Fisherman's Path from the Iron Bridge.
